#### September 16, 2010: The Autumn Equinox

Welcome to another season of gathering for monthly rituals. The Autumn Equinox, September 21, marks the official beginning of autumn when both night and day are balanced by being the same length. The Autumnal Equinox occurs once a year when the sun crosses the equator and shines equally on the northern and southern hemispheres.


