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"Now More Than Ever" By Mary E. Hunt

WATER celebrates forty years of study, spirituality, and solidarity. Just as we took the temperature of the world in 1983 when we started, now is a good interval to reflect on this moment and how we approach the future.

Latanay Mapp Frett, President and CEO of the Global Fund for Women, took the words out of my mouth in the subtitle to her book *The Everyday Feminist: Driving Movements We Need Now More Than Ever.* WATER is part of one such movement of feminist studies in religion and action broadly construed. Now, more than ever, the work of changing minds and hearts is a powerful part of any political efforts.

In 1983, Ronald Reagan's administration invaded Grenada. The U.S. sent Cruise missiles to the British Greenham Common Air Force Base. Mobile phones began to proliferate. Cabbage Patch Dolls were popular. Gas was 96 cents per gallon. Average rents were \$335 per month. Terrible as some of the 80's were, they were simpler times. Still, Reaganomics and the saber rattling of the day sent some of our stalwart Washington, DC friends and colleagues to work locally rather than on Capitol Hill. We all understood, but little did we know what was ahead.

2023 offers breathtaking, dizzying challenges with little hope. Post-Covid, there are wars in Ukraine, South Sudan, and other civil unrests for which non-violence makes the most sense. Gun violence in the U.S. is as common as apple pie, with mass shootings so frequent that many are inured to them. A twice impeached former president and presidential candidate has been found guilty of one crime and will soon go on trial for another, and then another. What does it take to persuade the unpersuadable?

Nothing is simple today. Racism kills. Small children are pawns in immigration struggles. Climate change is denied only by the most recalcitrant. Women's reproductive health and trans rights are barometers of a steadily failing web of care and a relentless attack on dignity, liberties, and human rights. Artificial Intelligence will not save us from ourselves.

WATER and sibling groups persist despite the uphill struggle to make sense, more important, to make change. The speed with which wealth accumulates for the endowed is matched only by the speed with which those in need are crushed by forces they cannot control. Their suffering—refugees, children without childhoods, people priced out of medical care—becomes unbearable to observe.

But bearing it is just what our various religious and humanist traditions require of us, bearing so that we may act. Feminist insights into the common fabric of life offer strength and strategies. After all, feminists have advocated for interstructural work and interreligious collaboration for decades. If we do not denounce white Christian nationalism and Islamophobia who will?

That is why as WATER moves into our next decade, come what may, we are confident that we are doing what needs doing: educating, upholding, networking, and creating the new out of which we hope will come more effective tools for change.

She was a regular participant in WATER's Feminist Liberation Theologians' Network and a stalwart member of the American Academy of Religion/Society of Biblical Literature's Women's Caucus.

Her work spanned not only two continents, but many themes including ecofeminism, postcolonialism, and HIV/AIDS. Like her friend and colleague Rosemary Radford Ruether, she will long be remembered as a wonderful person as well as a strong scholar, a kind professor as well as a principled activist. Long may her memory inspire us.



In January, we gathered with Su Yon Park and Mychal B. Spring to learn about the book they edited, Sisters in Mourning: Daughters Reflecting on Care, Loss, and Meaning. They, along with contributors Linda Jaramillo and Kathleen Talvacchia, spoke about caring for and grieving the loss of their mothers. A book to share.



Jeanette Stokes, an ordained Presbyterian minister who is frank about the boringly outdated beliefs so many people still cling to out of habit, joined us in February to talk about her book, Making the Road As We Go. The work of the Resource Center for Women and Ministry in the South, which she founded and directs, reflects her deepest commitments to creating a just and sustainable world. We are honored to work with her.



In March on International Women's Day, Karma Lekshe Tsomo, a specialist in Buddhist studies, spoke about her important book, Women in Buddhist Traditions. The message of this marvelous presentation and conversation was clear: Buddhism has had many expressions in many places over 2500 years. Patriarchal social conditions play a large role in how it is shaped. Contemporary women are putting their own stamp on it with Karma Lekshe Tsomo showing the way.

She and University of Newcastle colleague Kathleen McPhillips found concrete data about Catholic women's views on a patriarchal church.


WATER and Women of Dignity Collaboration
